

From Death to Life: Dry Bones & the Raising of Lazarus

This week, all of our readings for Sunday are very *meaty*! Where to start? From sinews, flesh and the raising of mortal bodies, these Scriptures are packed with so much imagery, meaning and power, which all tie in together very nicely this week as a precursor to what we will celebrate in just a couple of weeks; namely the resurrection of Jesus after His death.


Ezekiel finds himself in a vision where he sees a pile of bones – very old and dry, way past a mere few days time. But as he obeys the Lord, he finds that the Lord acts as promised. The Lord asks Ezekiel, *“Mortal, can these bones live?”* Ezekiel gives the right answer, *“O Lord God, you know.”* (Ezekiel 37:3) Ezekiel was willing to suspend any mortal disbelief and defer to God's knowledge and power. Ezekiel speaks what the Lord commands, and then sees dry, dusty bones reforming into living human beings right before his eyes. The Lord promises Ezekiel that this is what will happen to the people who have lost all hope and feel cut off because of their exile.

In the face of disappointment and sorrow over the death of her brother, Lazarus, Martha settles for theological concepts while still retaining a glimmer of hope by saying to Jesus *“But even now I know that God will give you whatever you ask of him.”* (John 11:22) Maybe Martha did not dare to hope for anything more, since Lazarus was already dead, and most definitely out of reach of divine intervention. But when push came to shove, Martha answered in the affirmative when Jesus asked if she believed in Him. (John 11:27) Lazarus had been in the tomb for four days already, but that didn't stop Jesus – all He said was *“Lazarus, come out!”* and Lazarus did so, very much alive with all the grave wrappings still on him!

But perhaps a lot of us are now stuck where Martha & Mary once were and are saying *“Lord, if you had been here, my loved one would not have died. You could have intervened in my impossible situation, but you didn't.”* Luckily, Jesus meets each one of us right where we are, so we can surrender anything to Him that has been long dead in our lives and in need of transformation. What are the situations where we have lost all hope and feel cut off from receiving the help that we need? Where in our lives have we experienced death, but now need an infusion of life and to believe that the Holy Spirit can help us? Paul's words to us this week can encourage us: *“But you are not in the flesh; you are in the Spirit, since the Spirit of God dwells in you and if the*

Spirit of him who raised Jesus from the dead dwells in you, he who raised Christ from the dead will give life to your mortal bodies also through his Spirit that dwells in you." (Romans 8:9-11)



HOLY WEEK & EASTER SERVICES



Palm Sunday, The Sunday of the Passion **SUNDAY, MARCH 28-29, 5:30 PM, 8 & 10AM SERVICES**


This solemn day marks the beginning of Holy Week and the turbulent journey to the Cross. We begin by joining Jesus' triumphal procession into the city of Jerusalem with joyful "*Hosannas!*", and end with the confusion and fear that leads to the cross. At the end of each service the Passion will be read, and the congregation will be asked to maintain silence as they leave the church. Regular Saturday and Sunday service times apply, and Coffee Hour will be held in the Parish Hall afterward.



Maundy Thursday

THURSDAY, APRIL 2, 5:30 PM

Maundy Thursday is the day that commemorates the Last Supper with Jesus and His disciples. The word "Maundy" comes from the Latin word *mandatum*, which means "commandment" and refers to Jesus's statement "*A new commandment I give unto you: That you love one another, as I have loved you, that you also love one another.*" (John 13) This Scripture is what Jesus says in regard to the washing of one another's feet, which takes place during this service for all who wish to participate.



Good Friday

FRIDAY, APRIL 3, 5:30 PM

Good Friday is the day of the crucifixion and death of Jesus on the Cross. This service provides time for us as Christians to meditate on His ultimate sacrifice that opens the way for us to receive eternal life through His glorious resurrection. This service is very stark in comparison to Sunday services and does not include the Eucharist, yet is very meaningful in its austerity. The congregation will be asked to maintain contemplative silence both as they enter and exit the church.



The Great Vigil of Easter

SATURDAY, APRIL 4, 7:30 PM

This lesser known service is actually one of the most beautiful of all during the Church Year. It starts in with the lighting of a new fire (outside) and candlelight inside the church. The first part of the service in darkness features many readings to prepare us for the joyful and dramatic proclamation of "*Alleluia! Christ is Risen!*" which coincides with the dramatic turning on of all the lights in the church and culminates with a joyful Eucharist. Easter has officially begun!



Easter Sunday

SUNDAY, APRIL 5, 8 AM and 10 AM

This great service needs no introduction, as it is the church service most attended by Christians and non-Christians alike. Easter is the most joyous celebration of the Church as we rejoice over the defeat of death and the grave by the Resurrection of Jesus. This service will feature very joyful music at the 10 AM service including brass and timpani along with choir and organ. Looking to Deepen Your Faith?



Ask, Seek, Knock...

This week in Sunday School, we will be exploring Jesus' invitation to "Ask, Seek, Knock" (Matthew 7:7–8). In these familiar yet profound words, Jesus opens the door to a deeper understanding of prayer—not as something formal or distant, but as a living, ongoing relationship with God. He teaches us that we can come before God with confidence, trusting that we are heard, known, and loved.

Together, we will reflect on what it means to ask with trust, to seek with open hearts, and to knock with perseverance. Jesus reminds us that God is not hidden or far away, but present and attentive—a loving Father who desires to give good gifts to His children. We will also begin to consider how God answers prayer in ways that shape us, guide us, and draw us closer to Him, even when the answers are not what we expect.

Through discussion, guided reflection, and hands-on activities, the children will be encouraged to think about their own prayer lives. They will be invited to see prayer not as something they must say perfectly, but as a quiet conversation

with God—one that can happen anytime, anywhere, and in any circumstance. Our hope is that they begin to recognize that God is always near, gently inviting them to come, to seek, and to trust.

We are grateful to walk alongside your children as they grow in faith and come to know God more deeply.



March is Colon Cancer Awareness Month

It's March! Time to talk turkey with the Gastroenterology Chick! I will try to not bore you with statistics and medical jargon.

Guess what? Colonoscopy is the only cancer screening technique that can actually prevent cancer, not just detect it.



I have been a gastroenterology nurse for 20 years. One of the biggest concerns people about having a colonoscopy is fear of being embarrassed. Never have I ever heard a health care professional comment on or joke about a patient during a colonoscopy. No one is interested in seeing your derriere. File that under the "seen one you've seen them all" category. I HAVE seen a wife take her husband's hand and cry upon finding out he has colon cancer. I have had people tell me, "I'm never having

that done." Boy, are they misguided. Folks who say that have never seen someone suffering with colon cancer. Colonoscopies save lives. Got that? A 30 minute procedure CAN PREVENT CANCER .

Here is how: get a baseline colonoscopy at age 45. If you are over 45 and not had one, DO IT. Early detection of colon polyps is the key. Polyps are small but often precancerous growths in the colon. If your doctor finds polyps (which can only be found during a colonoscopy) they will be removed. Polyps gone, so is cancer risk. If you do not have a colonoscopy, and you have polyps, they most likely will develop in to colon cancer. Sorry, it is true. Colo -Guard, ultrasounds, virtual colonoscopies CANNOT remove polyps.

Now, let's get to the preparation. First, congratulate yourself for scheduling your colonoscopy! OK, the day before the procedure is no picnic. In fact, it's no food at all. And a kind of yucky but do-able drink. It is worth every gulp! The day of the procedure? It is relatively easy. And safe. You will be sedated during the procedure and will not feel a thing. You will wake up quickly, feel rested and you can eat as soon as you are discharged.

Want to make it even easier? I will tell you how. Starting now: Eat 30 grams of fiber daily. Fiber helps to keep your bowels moving and keeps your colon healthy. Don't smoke. Exercise. Easy on the red meat, partner! Doctors do not know exactly what causes colon polyps. Probably poor diet (lack of fiber, too much processed food.) Research shows it could be hereditary. Which is why, if you have a family history of colon cancer, you need to be tested earlier than age 45.

To underscore the importance of a screening colonoscopy, consider this: for men and women combined, colon cancer is the second leading cause of cancer deaths. More than 51,000 Americans die each year from colon cancer. That's it for statistics!

So no more excuses. Tell your family practitioner you want a referral for a screening colonoscopy.

ALL names that are in the bulletin have been submitted to our chapter of the Order of the Daughters of the King, which means that **even if a names comes off from the bulletin list, that person is still being prayed for**

according to their guidelines. If it is known that if someone has a long term illness, such as cancer, that name stays on their list for at least a year, and that time can be adjusted according to the need of the individual involved.


