When the search committee distributed the parish questionnaire in 2020, some of the important goals of the parish were to attract new members and to resurrect the youth and children's programs. These are indeed important goals if we are to maintain a vibrant, sustainable parish. That said, it will require advanced financial planning to develop the needed programs to staff and accomplish those goals.

We are all aware that Stewardship is not just about money, but about giving of ourselves, our time and talents as well. We are all called to give in many ways and each of us is responsible to discover and use the special gifts God has entrusted to us. Using these gifts to benefit others and fulfill God's mission brings much joy into our lives, and everyone can contribute in some small way, regardless of age or financial situation.

It is my hope that we will all reflect on this prayerfully, so that this year's Stewardship campaign might be marked by a generous and joyful spirit of giving back to God what is, after all, rightly God's. May God bless us all with that grace.
